We are hurtling through the month of November and it feels quite remarkable that this will be my last newsletter for this month! Over the past 5 days we have been involved in the hosting and organisation of the Uttlesford Careers Fair which took place on Tuesday at Saffron Hall. It was great to see the range of employers engaged in conversations with our pupils at the event and hopefully it might just have provided some inspiration for some of our young people on what their future path might look like. On Wednesday afternoon, we welcomed a colleague from the University of Hertfordshire to come and speak to our sixth form students about university life and what it might entail for them. We also had excellent engagement from our year 8 parents and carers yesterday evening with appointments at our virtual parents' evening. And, of course, the mock exam season rolls on. We have received several thank you emails this week from parents and carers of year 11 pupils about the support that has been provided. We greatly appreciate this feedback, as well as of course your thoughts on how we might make the process even smoother for future years, and it has been excellent to see how hard our year 11 pupils are working to achieve their very best. This will hold them in great stead for the public examinations in May.

Further updates this week are as follows:

As you know, over the summer period we installed an improved CCTV system and brand-new access control on buildings. We now intend to progress with the third and final phase of this project and are seeking planning permission for a significant fencing project throughout the site. This will mean that our community is more secure but will also affect how visitors access our site on a day-to-day basis. We will provide you with further information once the planning process is complete.
