# Project Title: The history of the Olympic Games

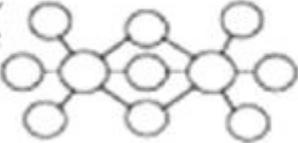

<p>Explore the history of the Olympic Games, when did it begin? Where was it hosted first? Who won the competition for the first time?</p> <p><b>Create a timeline of landmarks for the sporting event, include any historical moments that have occurred throughout the history of the event.</b></p>	<p>Create your own sporting event! What activities could these include? How many people take part in each event?</p> <p><b>Remember to complete these events yourself! Take part in your events, be creative! Make sure it can be done safely and with appropriate equipment.</b></p>	<p>How has the media impacted your major sporting event? Has it changed the way the event takes place? Has there been an increase in money supporting the event? Create a presentation to explain this.</p> <p><b>Think about what happens to a sport when the media attention increases. More money? More sponsors?</b></p>	<p>Create an advertisement for your chosen sporting event, the idea of this is that you are responsible for boosting ticket sales!</p> <p><b>Make it big, make it colourful, and persuade your reader that they must attend the sporting event of your choice!</b></p>	<p>Create your own commentary for a major sporting competition/match. This could be a 100m sprint race, it could be a big moment in a football match, it could even be commentating on a video you make of you and your family taking part in an activity!</p> <p><b>Be loud, be passionate, and create the drama of your sporting moment/event!</b></p>

Create a presentation on the impact of social media on teenage health and well-being.</p> <p><b>Remember – health isn't just physical, it is also social and mental well-being.</b></p>	<p>Create a home workout plan aimed at teenagers, how can teenagers keep fit at home? Explore different exercise types and routines/styles.</p> <p><b>Create an exercise plan to follow for two weeks, remember to plan in a rest day or two!</b></p>	<p>How does gaming impact our health? What about playing sport for a team? Explore the connection between activity rates and health and fitness.</p> <p><b>Does playing computer games impact our health? Does it affect our mental well-being?</b></p>	<p>Create an infographic focusing on teenage hygiene, what is required to be hygienic? Think about daily routines teenagers can/should follow to keep on top of their personal hygiene and health.</p> <p><b>Remember – All teenagers have different needs, boys/girls and different age groups. Teenagers are all the way from 13-19!</b></p>	<p>Create a news story that you will present on tonight's news! The report will be investigating teenage health. Are the teenagers in the local community healthy? Are they doing enough physical activity? Have your say!</p> <p><b>Remember – This is <u>your</u> news story, this is <u>your</u> investigation, include plenty of detail, maybe interview a family member as part of your news presentation. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Local Heroes: Research a soldier, nurse, or civilian from your local area who contributed during WW1 or WW2.</li> <li>Life on the Home Front: Investigate what everyday life was like for families during the wars (rationing, evacuation, community efforts).</li> <li>Symbols of Remembrance: Explore the history of the poppy, remembrance ceremonies, and why we still commemorate today.</li> <li>Roles in the War: Research one role (e.g., codebreakers, medics, pilots, factory workers) and explain what they did.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Interview a Family Member: Ask an older relative about what they know or remember about wartime stories in your family.</li> <li>Create a Memory Box: Fill a small box with objects or drawings that represent remembrance (e.g., a poppy, a letter, a medal sketch).</li> <li>Map Activity: Mark key countries involved in WW1 or WW2 on a world map and label significant locations.</li> <li>Recipe Reconstruction: Make a simple wartime recipe (e.g., ration-era biscuits) with adult supervision.</li> <li>Remembrance Walk: Visit a local memorial or plaque (with an adult) and note down names or inscriptions. It honors individuals or organizations for outstanding achievements, discoveries, or contributions that have conferred the greatest benefit to humankind. Six, often annual, prizes are awarded in physics, chemistry, physiology or medicine, literature, peace, and economic sciences.</p> <p>Research the origins of the Nobel Prize and who Alfred Nobel was.</p> <p>Research at least three previous Nobel Prize Winners.</p> <p>Why did they win the Nobel Prize? Research one Nobel Prize Winner and look closely at their acceptance speech.</p>	<p>Design and/or create your own Nobel Prize. What would your prize look like? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Food Timeline: Research key moments in the history of British food (e.g., Roman influence, medieval spices, post-war immigration).</li> <li>Global Ingredients: Investigate ingredients commonly used in Britain today that originally came from other parts of the world (e.g., potatoes, tomatoes, spices, tea).</li> <li>Cultural Contributions: Choose one culture (e.g., Indian, Caribbean, Italian, Chinese, Middle Eastern) and explore how it has influenced British cooking.</li> <li>Traditional British Dishes: Research the origins of dishes like fish and chips, roast dinner, Cornish pasties, or Yorkshire pudding.</li> <li>Migration and Food: Explore how migration to Britain has shaped the food available in shops and restaurants.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Family Recipe Investigation: Ask a family member about a recipe that is important to your family and find out where it originally came from.</li> <li>Food Map of Britain: Create a map showing famous regional dishes (e.g., Welsh cakes, Scottish shortbread, Cornish pasties).</li> <li>Ingredient Hunt: Look at food packaging at home and list where different ingredients come from around the world.</li> <li>Simple Cooking Task: With adult supervision, make a simple dish that reflects cultural fusion (e.g., pasta with British vegetables, mild curry, or a fruit crumble).</li> <li>Restaurant Survey: Walk down a local high street (with an adult) and note the different types of cuisines represented.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Part of British values is based on cultural diversity. Discuss the reasons why this has been so beneficial for British Cuisine and the British food industry.
